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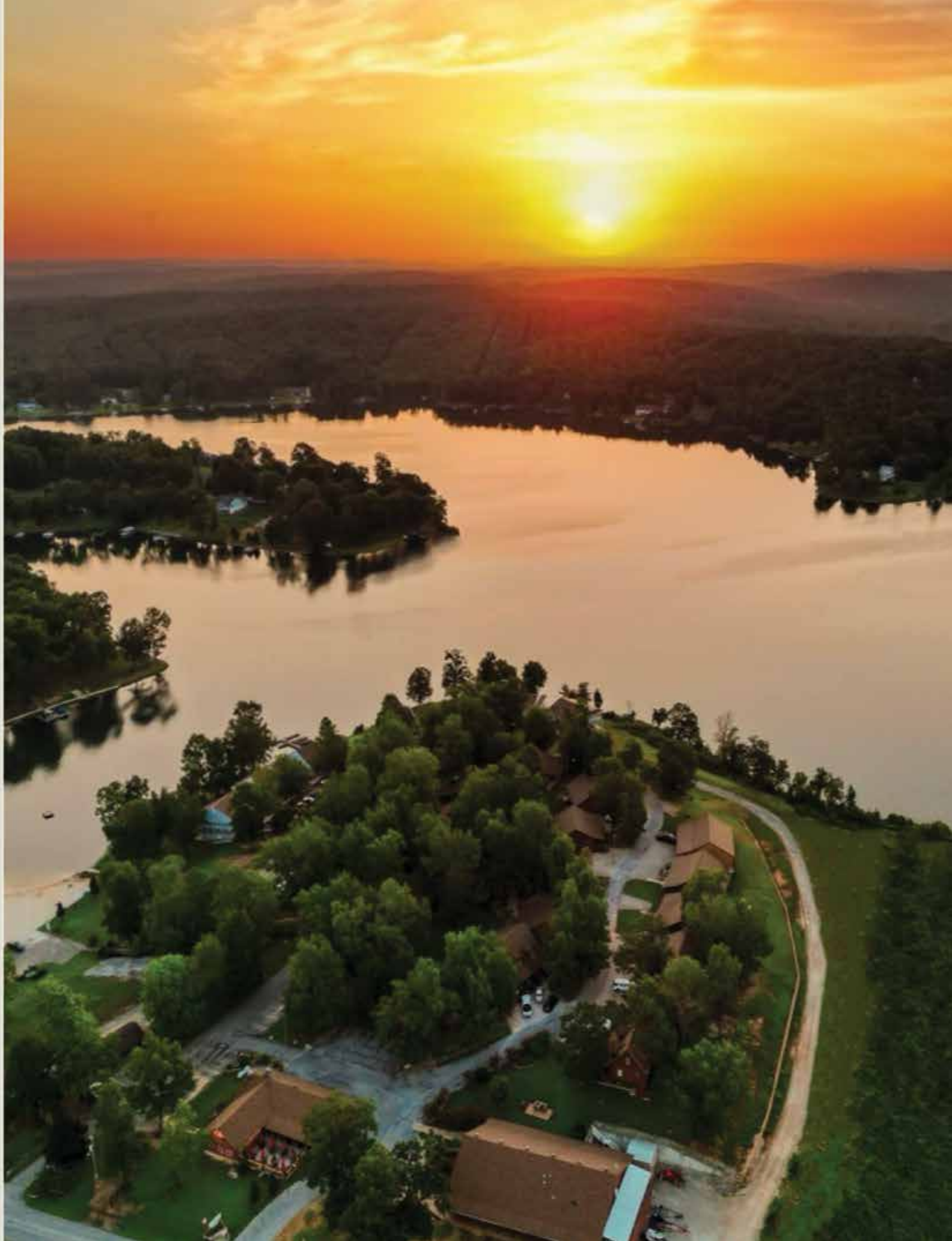


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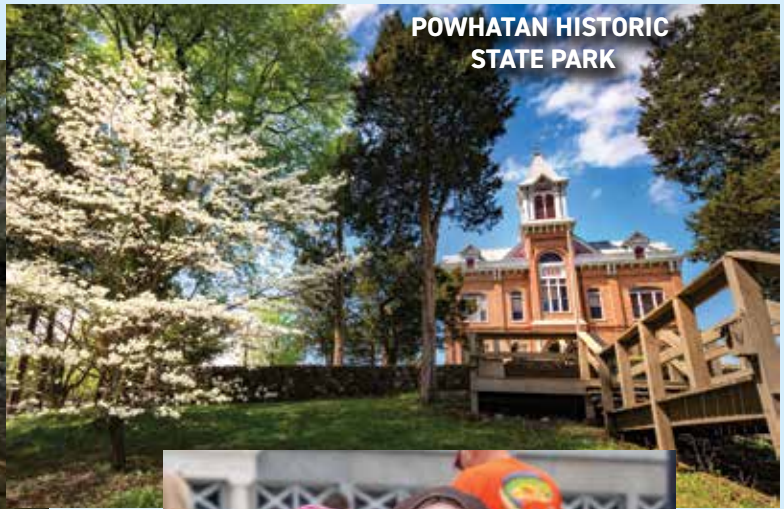

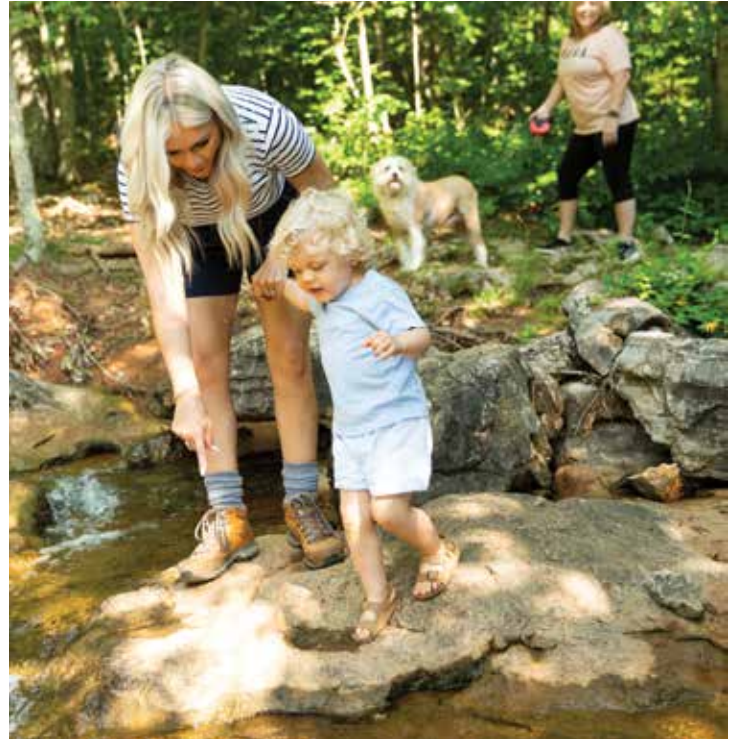
A HIDDEN GEM IN THE HEART OF ARKANSAS

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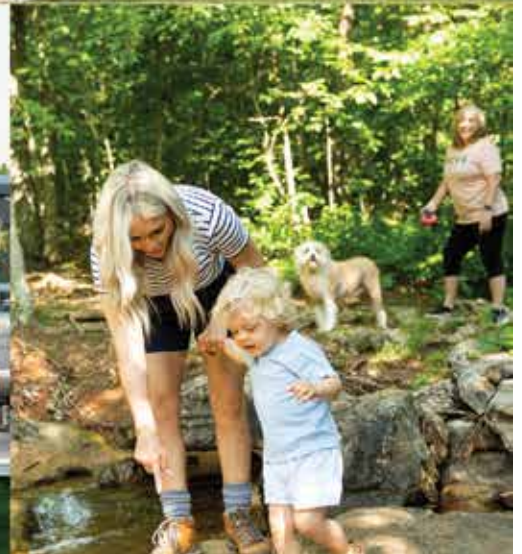
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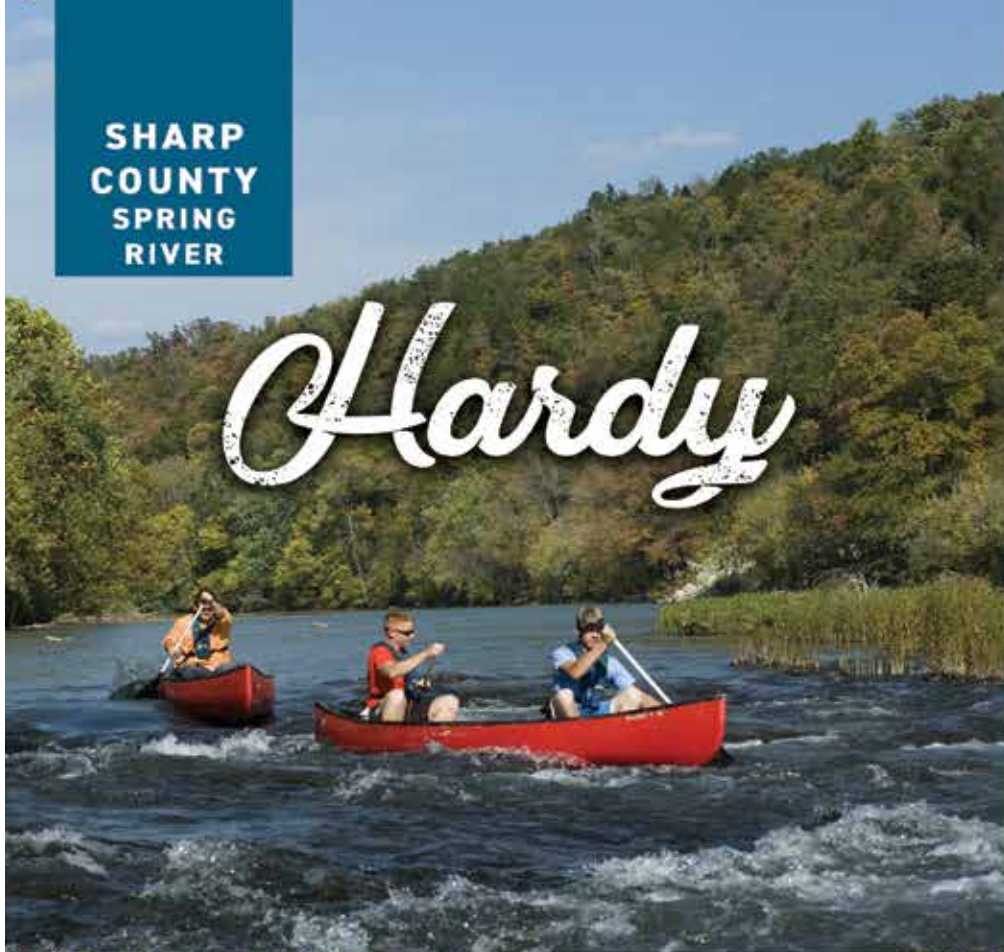

ANTIQUE SHOPS, OZARK CULTURE, AND THE SCENIC SPRING RIVER

Positioned in the heart of "Spring River Country," Hardy is a charming, historic town in the Ozark foothills that features a well-preserved downtown area listed on the National Register of Historic Places, filled with eclectic, locally owned antique shops and craft malls, boutiques,

and art galleries.

A hub for outdoor recreation along the spring-fed Spring River, Hardy serves as a popular destination for canoeing, trout fishing, kayaking, rafting, and exploring unique specialty shops in a turn-of-the-century setting. Visitors won't want to miss the Hardy History Museum and Spring River Art Gallery. nor the many local dining options in the

quaint town.

Paying homage to the community's beginnings in the 1800s during a railroad construction boon, Homesteaders Day is a popular, free event showcasing historical demonstrations like blacksmithing, spinning, and candle making, along with live music, bluegrass, and a beard contest.

Other key festivals and activities in the town include the Treasures in the Ozarks, Main Street Ghost Tours, live music from May to October, bike rides, the Christmas Parade, and more.

Hardy is the perfect destination for anyone wanting to explore the Natural State.

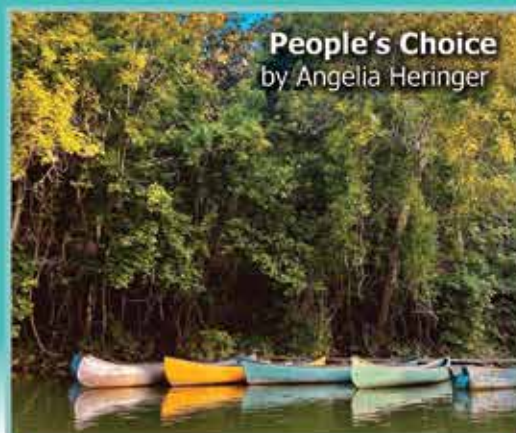

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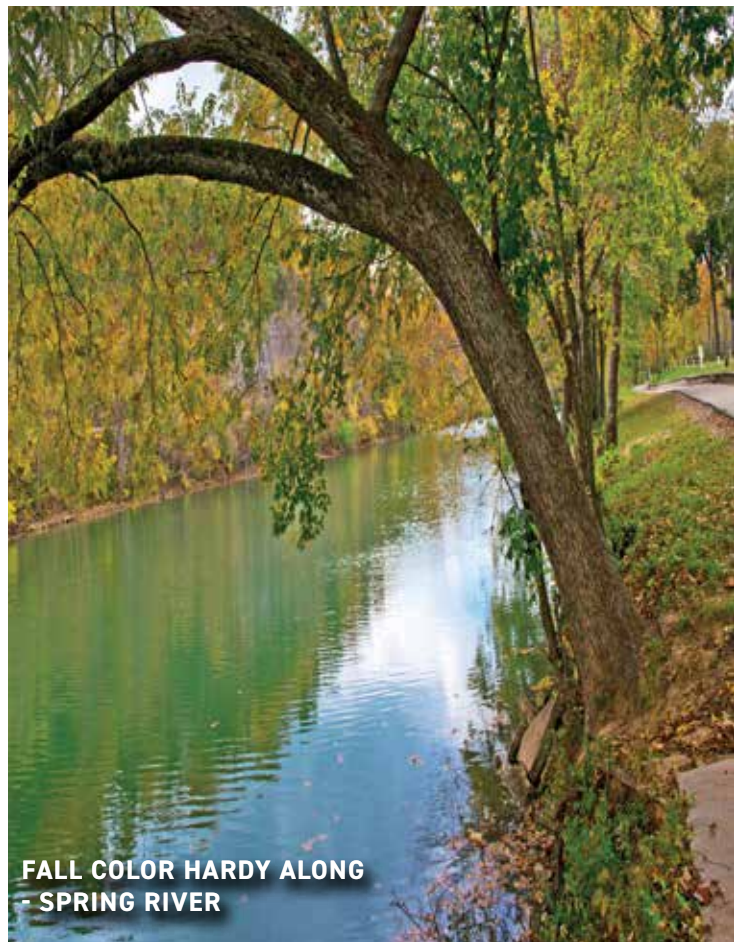

Explore Mammoth Spring:

NATURE'S MASTERPIECE IN THE OZARKS

Mammoth Spring is the largest spring in Arkansas and a National Natural Landmark, pouring out an incredible 9 million gallons of crystal-clear water every hour. This massive surge creates a scenic 10-acre lake before spilling south into the Spring River, a premier destination for Ozark trout fishing and float trips.

Mammoth Spring State Park features paved walking paths, scenic overlooks, and various programs held throughout the year, such as Birds of Prey, Movies in the Park, Mammoth Spring Car Show, Art in the Park, and more. History buffs will want to check out the park's 1886 Frisco Depot – one of the most unique museums in Arkansas. This restored, turn-of-the-century Victorian station features custom-sculpted

life-sized figures that portray the train crew, depot crew and train passengers, while the baggage room includes exhibits of railroad artifacts. A Frisco caboose parked just outside is open for touring, too. Before hitting the hiking trails or visiting the playground, make the welcome center your first stop to pick up complimentary guides to Arkansas and browse the unique treasures waiting in the gift shop.

Mammoth Spring isn't just a natural wonder; it's also a site rich in history and played a critical role in the area's development. During the Civil War, Mammoth Spring's strategic proximity to transportation routes made it a target for both Union and Confederate forces. After Union troops seized control in 1862, the

site became a crucial supply depot for the remainder of the conflict. Since 1890 the area has hosted the Old Soldiers, Sailors and Marines Reunion (formerly the "Reunion of the Blue and Gray"). The centerpiece of this history is the 3,500-pound cannon in Cannon Park. Delivered by the Department of War in 1893, it was fired to signal the start and end of each festival day until it was finally retired.

The spring's dependable flow year-round would make it ideal for powering industries in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Today, the steady flow of the spring makes the Spring River one of the state's best year-round floats even during the summer months when river levels tend to fall.

The Spring River is one of Arkansas' premier destinations for trout and walleye, but what makes it truly unique is its source. Unlike other trout streams fed by man-made dams, the Spring River's cold water comes naturally from a spring, and the river stays

cold enough to support a thriving trout population for 10 miles downstream.

As one of the nation's oldest hatcheries, the Mammoth Spring National Fish Hatchery and Aquatic Conservation Center was established in the Ozark foothills to harness the cool, gravity-fed waters of the world-famous spring. Its proximity to the railroad made it a historic hub for conservation. Today, it's a perfect family destination – kids can feed the fish, discover aquatic life up close, and maybe even take home a new plush friend from the Cast a Line Gift Shop.

Just a few miles down the road is the Jim Hinkle State Fish Hatchery. This vital hub produces more than 1 million 11-inch rainbow trout annually. These fish sustain the state's premier angling destinations, including the Bull Shoals and Greers Ferry tailwaters, the Spring River, and Blanchard Springs, as well as

seasonal community ponds throughout South Arkansas. The hatchery also hosts an annual fishing derby that is a great way to get kids "hooked" on the sport.

Mammoth Spring offers campsites, cabins, RV spots, and motel lodging, with attractions like canoeing, kayaking and floating – not to mention various restaurants nearby. People come from all over to enjoy the catfish, hush puppies and other local cuisine.

Beyond the water's edge, downtown Mammoth Spring invites visitors to stroll the historic main street lined with eclectic boutiques and antique shops. Between browsing for unique treasures and chatting with friendly locals, the area's small-town charm is sure to entice.

Whether you're here to fish, take photos, or simply watch the water pour from the earth, Mammoth Spring offers a powerful experience that leaves an impression.

HISTORIC STREETS, RIVER ADVENTURES, AND HOLIDAY MAGIC

Step back in time in Batesville – Arkansas' oldest city. Established in 1821, this historic gem blends 19th-century architectural charm with the natural beauty of the White River. This timeless landmark is the heart of the community, offering a scenic backdrop to a city rooted deep in Southern heritage.

If you enjoy being on the water, the Poke Bayou is the ideal spot to float, kayak, fish and swim. For those who prefer exploring on land, the city's history comes to life downtown, with charming 19th-century buildings, now home to unique shops and boutiques, restaurants and cafes, and art galleries. For a deeper look into the past, visit the Old Independence Regional Museum. From the pioneer days and the Civil War to the freshwater pearl

"rush" at the turn of the 20th century, the exhibits offer a fascinating window into the region.

Located just a few minutes south of Batesville, Jamestown Crag sits where the Ozark Mountains meet the Delta and is one of the premier rock-climbing spots in the state with 50 acres perfect for climbing, camping, hiking and biking. The Crag itself offers over 140 sport climbing routes on Arkansas sandstone, ranging from 5.5 to 5.13 and up to 90 feet tall – perfect for beginners and pros alike.

For sports enthusiasts, the Mark Martin Museum sits just south of town. It offers an in-depth look at the career of the NASCAR legend who got his start on the local tracks of his hometown.

Batesville truly earns its reputation as the "Christmas Capital of Arkansas," offering one of the most enchanting holiday experiences in the state. Each year, the city transforms into a winter wonderland, with millions of sparkling lights decorating Riverside Park. Take a nostalgic

carriage ride or board the holiday train for a tour of the grounds – or take in the views from high above on the Ferris wheel. Lace up your skates for ice skating, then warm up with a cup of hot cocoa and some freshly cooked kettle corn as you immerse

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yourself in the holiday spirit.

Batesville is also home to two institutions of higher learning. Founded in 1872, Lyon College liberal arts college is celebrated for its rigorous academics and unique Scottish heritage, highlighted by its popular annual Scottish Festival. The University of Arkansas Community College at Batesville is part of the University of Arkansas System, providing affordable, high-quality

This facility has greatly exceeded the community's expectations and has been a monumental addition to the City of Batesville. – with modern progress in healthcare and industrial growth.

Historically, the river has been a vital resource for farming and livestock irrigation, and today, the town serves as a scenic gateway to the region's premier outdoor recreation.

OIL TROUGH

With a population of just 220, Oil Trough is a hidden gem along the White River with

one of Arkansas' most unique backstories. Founded in the 19th century, this rural community earned its name from the troughs used by early hunters to render bear fat – a testament to its rugged pioneer roots. Today, the town is defined by its incredibly fertile river-bottom soil and a tight-knit atmosphere. If you're passing through, be sure to grab a bite at the Trough Stop, a local favorite for authentic small-town dining.

PLEASANT PLAINS

If you're looking for a peaceful escape, this charming town in southern Independence County is the perfect entry point. Offering a quieter, slower pace of life, it serves as a scenic southern gateway to the region. Its rolling fields and rural character are a beautiful nod to the county's deep-rooted farming history, making it a must-see for those who appreciate authentic, small-town Americana.

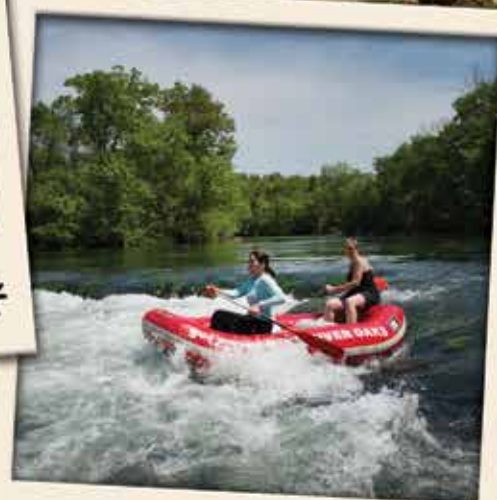

As the oldest city in the state, Batesville's roots run deep; recorded history began in 1804 with a single log cabin at the confluence of Polk Bayou and the White River. What started as a modest settlement and a trading post – noted for selling "whiskey and notions" – soon flourished. Its growth was fueled by the thousands of pioneers traveling the Old Southwest Trail, which crossed the river just downstream, cementing Batesville's legacy as a vital gateway for early American explorers.

Through dedicated partnerships and a passion for local culture, Main Street Batesville has created a vibrant destination where old-world charm meets modern energy. From eclectic shops,

restaurants and art galleries – not to mention the renovated historic Melba Theater to a packed calendar of inclusive events, there is a place here for everyone to feel at home.

The excitement continues to grow in 2026 with the debut of The River Haunt. Located at the corner of Main and State, this multipurpose facility will offer thrills and chills in the fall, while serving as a hub for holiday parties and youth activities year-round. This is sure to be a great complement to the vibrant Maxfield Park, an oasis that features a waterfall, meditation garden, stage area for live music, playground equipment and benches.

To top it all off, the Levitt AMP Music Series returns this year, bringing free weekly concerts and family-friendly entertainment to the center of it all. The 10-week series kicks off May 7; look for a schedule later this year.

The downtown Main Street business district is included in the National Register of Historic Places.

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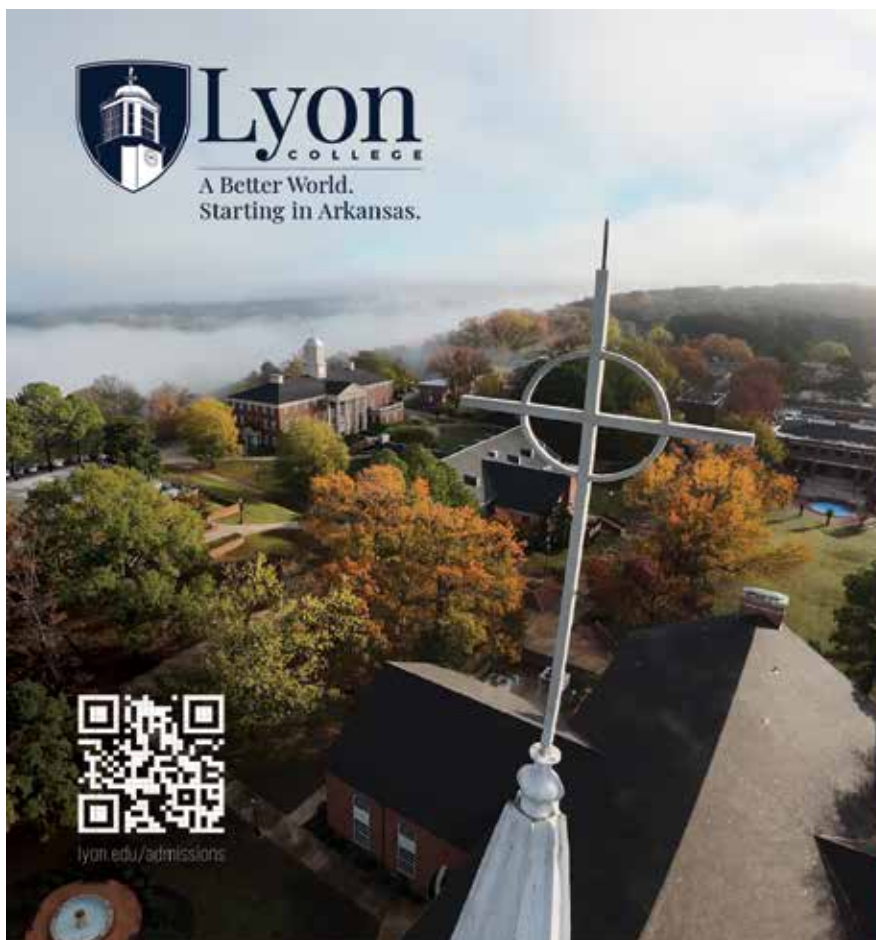
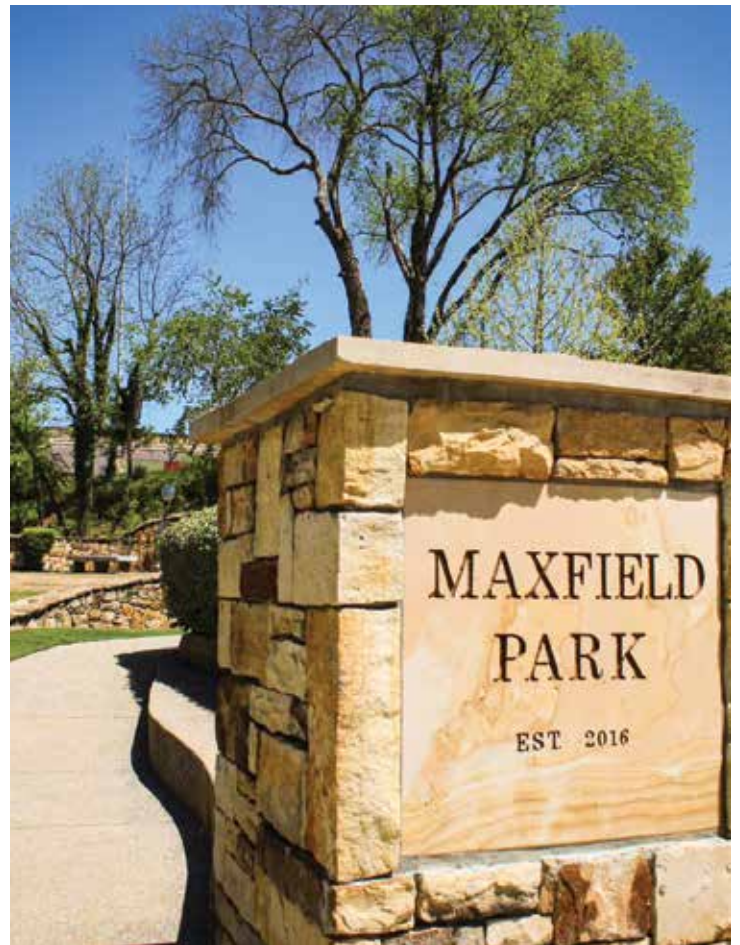


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Located along the shores of the White River, Batesville is a small community located in the north central section of the state about 90 miles from Little Rock.

Holding title as the oldest city in the state, the town is packed with history. The city can trace its recorded history to 1804, when a squatter was reportedly living in a log cabin where the Polk Bayou enters the White River. Within a few years, a little settlement had been established as well as a trading post, owned by John Reed and which sold "whiskey and notions." Within a few more years, the settlement was getting heavy exposure as thousands of pioneers were traveling across the state on the Old Southwest Trail, which crossed the White River just below Batesville.

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Tucked between the Ozarks and the Delta in northeast Arkansas, Newport and Jackson County offer visitors a destination that feels both grounded in history and alive with creative energy. Whether you're visiting for a weekend or staying a little longer, Newport invites you to experience Arkansas in a way

that's authentic, welcoming, and deeply rooted in place.

Much of the community's modern energy comes alive each year through the **Downtown Monster Series**, a collection of free concerts, festivals, and cultural events held from April through October in Front Street Park.

The downtown park becomes a seasonal gathering place where locals and visitors spread out lawn chairs and blankets, children dance near the stage, and live music fills the air. The series offers something for every interest, blending concerts, arts events, exhibits, and festivals into a calendar that keeps downtown Newport buzzing all summer long.

Among the signature events is the **Delta Arts Festival**, one of the region's most dynamic cultural showcases. The festival is uniquely multi-disciplinary, hosting three festivals simultaneously in downtown Newport. Visual artists line the streets with works ranging from pottery and painting to jewelry and sculpture, while musicians and performers add rhythm and movement to

the experience. More than 200 creatives participate, creating an atmosphere that feels both intimate and expansive. At the same time, the **Delta Festival of Books** brings more than 30 authors—many from Arkansas—who connect with readers eager to engage with Southern stories and voices.

Music, however, is more than an event in Newport—it's part of the town's DNA. In the 1950s, Jackson County played an unexpected role in the birth of rock 'n' roll. The so-called "rock 'n' roll train" steamed out of Memphis and rolled into nightclubs along Highway 67, stopping at venues like the Silver Moon and Porky's Rooftop in Newport and Bob King's King of Clubs in nearby Swifton. Legends such as Elvis Presley, Johnny

Cash, Jerry Lee Lewis, Carl Perkins, Roy Orbison, and Sonny Burgess all passed through, performing at local honky-tonks during the earliest days of the genre. That history remains a point of pride today, drawing music lovers eager to trace the roots of American rock.

Newport is equally inviting for families. Events like **Monster Kids Fest** are designed with younger visitors in mind, offering inflatables, games, crafts, interactive performances, and hands-on activities that keep children engaged throughout the day. Parks and green spaces throughout the city provide room to play and explore, including the Mary Alice Holden Conner Memorial Park in the heart of Newport, which features modern play stations, a zipline, walking trail, and gathering areas for families to relax and reconnect.

For outdoor enthusiasts, Jackson County delivers a landscape

shaped by water, woods, and wide-open spaces. Three rivers, numerous lakes, and wooded areas provide year-round recreation, from fishing and boating to birdwatching and hunting. Duck and deer seasons attract sportsmen from across the region, while anglers are drawn by the area's reputation for exceptional fishing. With both public and private preserves available, along with convenient lodging options, outdoor adventure is always within reach.



Just outside Newport, **Jacksonport State Park** offers a window into Arkansas's river-based past. Once one of the oldest and busiest steamboat ports in north Arkansas, Jacksonport played a vital role in regional trade and transportation. Today, visitors can explore the historic 1872 courthouse, browse exhibits at the Visitor Center, and enjoy sweeping views of the White River. The park also features

picnic areas, sandy beaches, a playground, the Tunstall Riverwalk, a boat launch, and full-service campsites, making it a destination that blends education, relaxation, and outdoor recreation.

Visitors are welcomed warmly, whether they're shopping at the Newport Farmers Market, exploring downtown, or chatting with locals who are proud to share stories of their hometown. With a regional airport, walkable downtown entertainment district, and a calendar full of events, Newport and Jackson County make it easy to arrive—and even easier to want to return.

Blending music history, creative expression, outdoor adventure, and small-town hospitality, Newport and Jackson County offer a destination that feels both timeless and vibrant. 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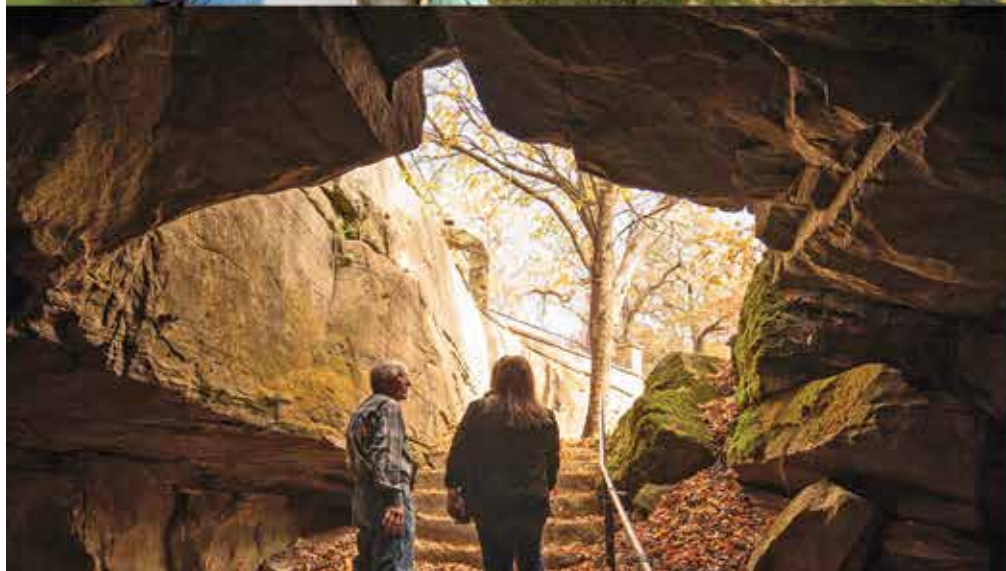

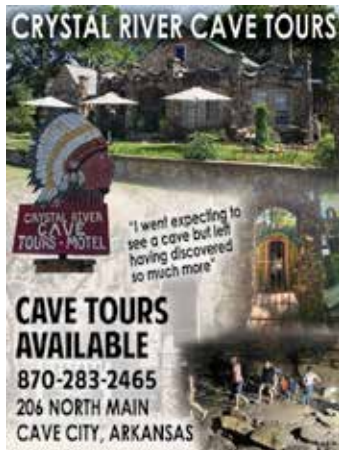

This free, three-day event, July 23-25th, will include entertainment, seed spitting contests, a 5K run, pancake breakfast, parade, activities for kids and adults, vendors and food trucks, craft fair, talent show, and a free melon feast, courtesy of the registered watermelon growers. This isn't just a local favorite; the festival was inducted into the Arkansas Food Hall of Fame in 2017 and named the Ozark Gateway Region's Festival of the Year in 2019. Built in the 1930s, this National Register of Historic Places site features walls of local fieldstone, intricately inlaid with geodes, quartz, and petrified wood forming patterns of animals and crosses. Coming in 2026, the motor court will debut two newly renovated lodging units, allowing you to stay right where the story began.

Cave City's revitalized Chamber of Commerce is breathing new life into the community, spotlighting the local leaders and businesses that make the area a premier destination. Main Street offers a vibrant mix of antique shops, retail, and dining, ranging from artisan dishes to home-cooked comfort food and specialty coffee. The community's commitment to excellence extends to the Cave City Nursing Home, which boasts a 5-Star CMS rating for its balance of high-quality clinical care and a warm, personal touch.

services like Fulton County Hospital and Salem Schools. The area also features a thriving Amish community with unique local businesses. Ever since the Beatles touched down at Walnut Ridge Airport in September 1964, this town has embraced its place in music history as a premier destination for fans. If you're looking for a blend of British Invasion nostalgia and Deep South rockabilly roots, Walnut Ridge is a must-visit. Located on Abbey Road (formerly SW 2nd Street), Beatles Park is home to a striking 20' x 10' hand-etched metal sculpture. The piece



features life-sized silhouettes of the Fab Four, artfully recreating the iconic Abbey Road album cover. It's the centerpiece of why we call downtown "Where Abbey Road Meets the Rock N' Roll Highway!" Rockabilly pioneers are memorialized at the Guitar Walk. As you stroll the "fretboard," you'll encounter displays honoring legends who played the local circuit, including Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash and Jerry Lee Lewis. An audio tour is



included, narrated by Sun Studios recording legend Sonny Burgess. Sonny shares insightful bits of history about each of the performers at the tribute, as well as song snippets of their music. Each September, downtown Walnut Ridge springs to life for the Beatles at the Ridge music festival. Enjoy two stages of entertainment and various vendors across multiple city blocks.



Located at the Walnut Ridge Airport, the Wings of Honor WWII Museum houses an impressive collection of displays and artifacts, ranging from weapons and uniforms to vintage vehicles. The museum offers visitors a glimpse into the past, specifically the era when Army fliers trained for combat at the former Walnut Ridge Army Flying School.

A few miles down the road is

Hoxie, where another important piece of history comes to life. Hoxie: The First Stand Museum opened in January 2026 and commemorates the 1955 desegregation of Hoxie schools, two years before the Little Rock Nine. This small farming community suddenly became the focus of national attention when the school board voted to end segregation, a decision met with both hope and resistance. This was the first segregation to be contested in court – and upheld by the Department of Justice. Although the town eventually faded from the headlines, the spirit of the movement remained alive through the dedication of local residents who refused to let this legacy be forgotten. Ethel Tompkins, the first Black student to graduate from Hoxie High School, now serves as the museum's president.

Nestled between Smithville and Black Rock, Jackson Farm is a premier family-owned destination for seasonal fun. Founded in 2015 with a mission to foster an appreciation for nature and farming, the farm aims to provide families with fun, educational, hands-on agricultural experiences. Visitors can enjoy various attractions, including a petting barn, hay rides, a corn maze, zip lines, giant slides, pony rides, jumping pads, fall photo opportunities and festival food, making it a popular spot for creating lasting memories.

Located in Walnut Ridge, Williams Baptist University is home to the stunning Manley Chapel and the industrious Eagle Farms. Through the innovative Williams Works initiative, students gain hands-on experience by working at the meat processing facility, an organic egg operation, greenhouses, and produce farm to earn their education. Visitors are welcome to tour the grounds or stop by Williams Corner (at Highway 67 and Fulbright Avenue) to shop for fresh products grown right on campus.

Within easy driving distance there are three state parks, which means you can visit all three parks in one day. Located in Powhatan, Powhatan Historic State Park preserves a 19th-century river port town, once a hub of northeast Arkansas commerce, industry and government. It features the 1888 courthouse, a jail, and other historic structures, offering guided tours on the Black River. Less than 10 minutes away, Lake Charles State Park offers a 645-acre lake that is known for excellent fishing (bass, crappie, bream), boating, camping, and swimming. Davidsonville Historic Park meanwhile preserves the site of the first town and county seat in the Arkansas Territory (1815).

The great outdoors define life in Lawrence County, particularly during the winter months when duck hunters from across the globe arrive to experience some of the world's finest waterfowl

hunting. Hunters can take advantage of sprawling fields and flooded timber, with various outfitters, guide services, and leased hunting grounds available to support their pursuit.

For travelers, the Amtrak terminal is situated within the historic Iron Mountain Depot in Walnut Ridge. This beautifully restored landmark now serves

as the home for the Lawrence County Chamber of Commerce. Those who prefer to arrive by air can utilize the Walnut Ridge Airport.

Experience the magic of the holiday season on Main Street in downtown Walnut Ridge, where the Light Up Downtown Christmas project transforms the area into a scene straight out of a Hallmark movie. Stewart Park

lights up with a vivid 1.5-mile trail of holiday scenes, providing a 1.5-mile loop for visitors to enjoy a casual drive from the warmth of their car – all for free!

No trip to Lawrence County is complete without exploring the vibrant dining and shopping scenes throughout our local communities. Whether you are craving sophisticated “uptown” cuisine or the comforting soul of

a “down-home” meal, you will find an array of culinary delights featuring everything from beloved local staples to exotic flavors from around the globe. Nestled along the iconic Rock ‘n’ Roll Highway, The Post Bakery & Bistro in Walnut Ridge perfectly captures the heart of small-town Arkansas. This local gem invites you to savor the aromas of Arkansas-roasted coffee and

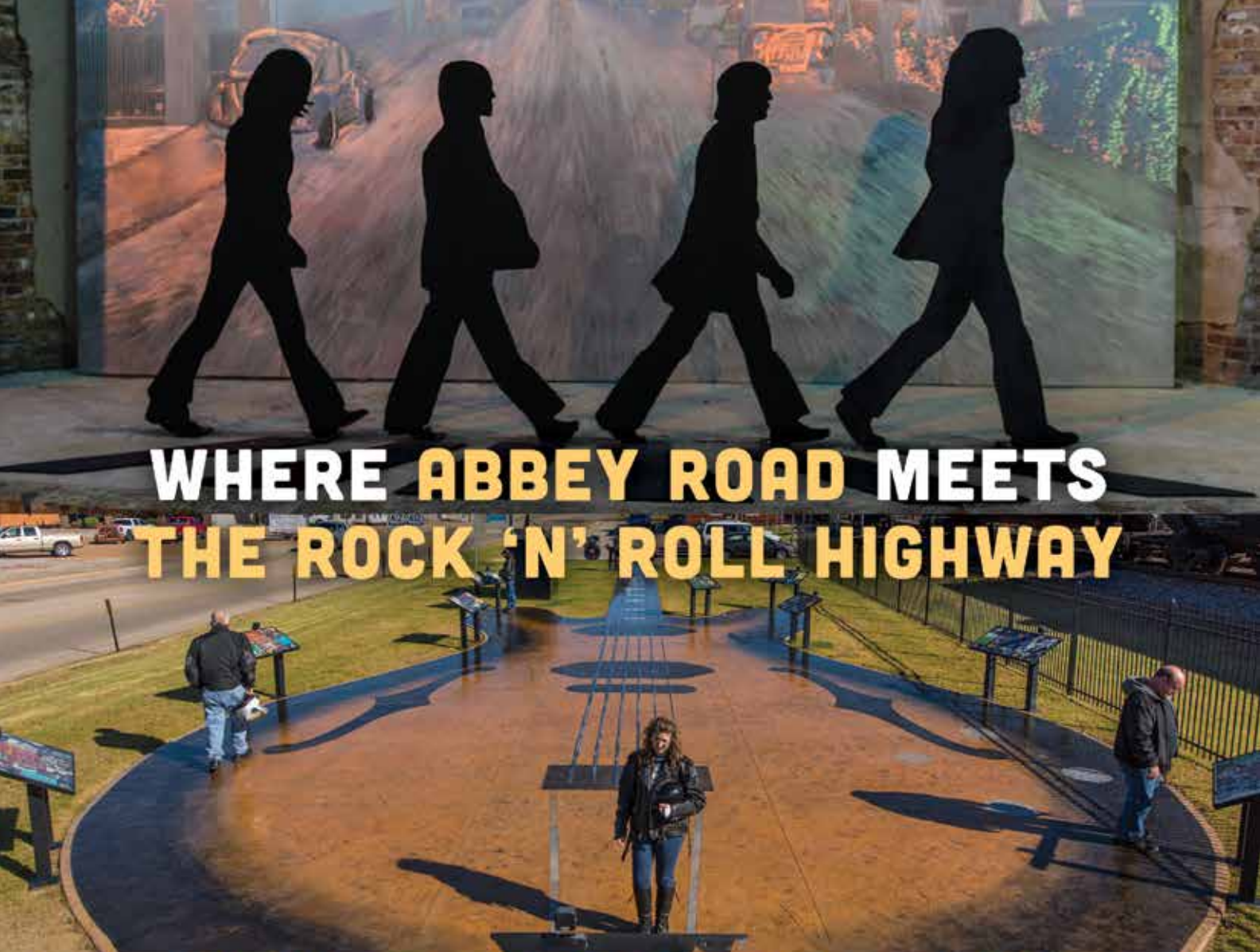

The Eddie Mae Herron Center

honors the legacy of education within the Black community and a spirit of resilience by the teacher, affectionately known as "Miss Eddie Mae." Pocahontas is also home to Arkansas' first quilt trail, Old Frisco Train Depot, and a statue of Princess Pocahontas in Black River Overlook Park. The Civil War River Walk pays homage to the

community's role in the Civil War, and Davidsonville Historic State Park preserves site of the town of Davidsonville, which includes the Territory's first post office and courthouse.

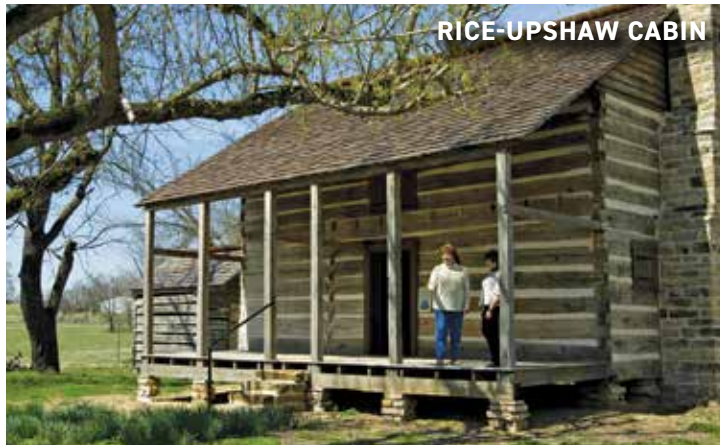
Other cultural sites in the area include Marr Street School of Performing Arts, the Rice House at

Dalton, which is the oldest log dwelling in the state, the fully-restored William Looney Tavern, which is the oldest log commercial building in Arkansas, and the Rock and Roll Highway 67. U.S. Highway 67 in Randolph County, as well as in Lawrence and Jackson counties, has been officially designated as Rock and Roll Highway 67 by the Arkansas Legislature due to the many pioneers and stars of early rock and roll who appeared at venues here. These include Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash, Roy Orbison, Jerry Lee Lewis, Fats Domino, Sonny Burgess and many more.

Other recreation opportunities include hiking, birding, golfing, shooting sports, and cycling as well as motorcycle riding, or visitors may want to check out the indoor/outdoor aquatic center with a water park with an indoor walking track, pickleball courts, and more.

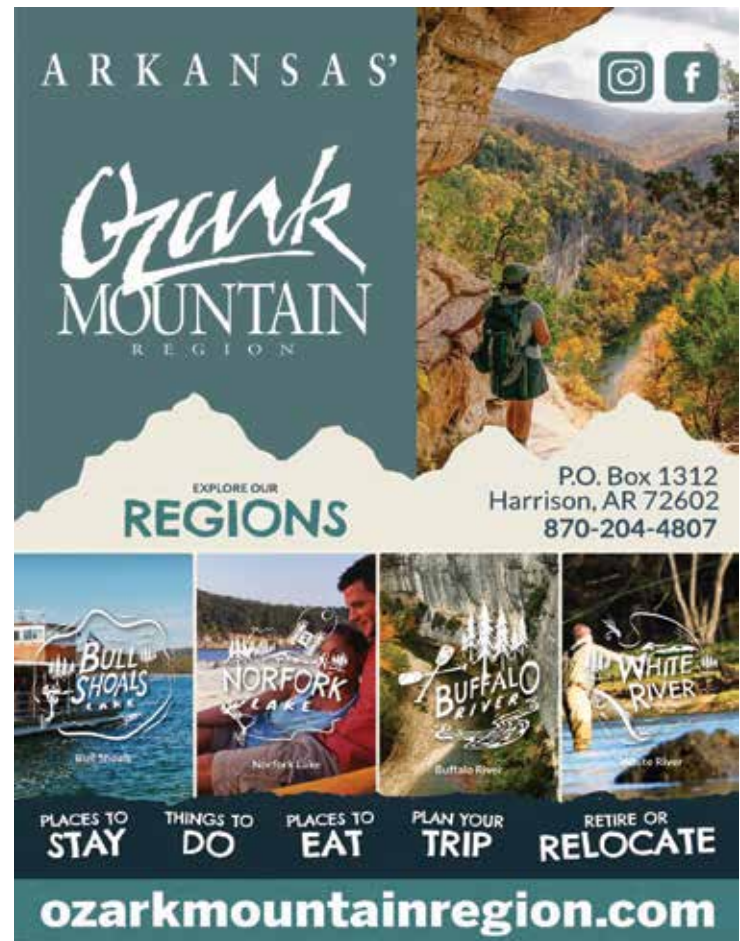

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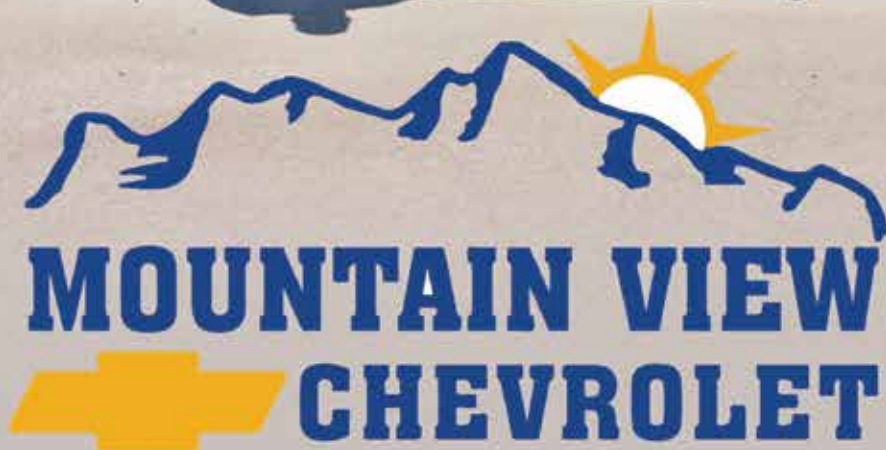

THE LIVING CAVE CAN HARDLY BE DESCRIBED IN WORDS!

Blanchard Springs – one of Arkansas' premier "living" caves – is officially transitioning from federal management to become the state's newest Arkansas State Park.

Located near Fifty-Six in Stone County, this underground marvel remains a cornerstone of The Natural State's beauty. The stunning cave system spans over eight miles of active formation growth, featuring one of the largest

flowstones in the country. Depending on your thirst for adventure, there are three distinct ways to go below:

The Dripstone Tour: An accessible half-mile walk through some of the cavern's most decorated chambers, filled with stalactites, "soda straws," a natural bridge, and the sweeping Cathedral Room. It's easy to see why this breathtaking route remains the favorite for the 70,000 guests who visit the caverns

annually.

The Discovery Trail: A deeper, more intensive trek 366 feet down, following the underground stream that carved the caverns to the Ghost Room and natural Rimstone Dams.

Wild Cave Tours: A rugged, seasonal option for those looking to scramble through the middle and more untamed sections of the caverns.

Although the caverns are currently closed for safety renovations – with a 2026 reopening date still uncertain – they represent only one chapter of the story here. There are multiple woody trails, one of which takes visitors alongside the aptly named Mirror Lake, a popular, spring-fed fishing hole. A short, accessible boardwalk leads to a viewing area, where the tranquility of the 58-degree water rushing over the stone and concrete dam built nearly 100 years ago will refresh anyone looking for a quiet

moment in nature.

Blanchard Springs also offers crystal-clear swimming holes with rocky beaches along North Sylamore Creek, picnic area with tables, grills and nearby restrooms, as well as a central RV dump station. There is also a campground with both single and group campsites, but if those sites fill up, there are other options nearby, namely Gunner Pool Recreation Area and Barkshed Recreation Area. While these sites are considered primitive camping, both areas are shady and private. Know before you go: Be prepared for no cell service throughout the recreation area.

Whether you're a casual sightseer or a hardcore spelunker, Blanchard Springs proves exactly why Arkansas earned its nickname.

retail home for a large, curated collection of items such as pottery, wood carvings, turned wooden bowls, flutes, cutting boards, jewelry, paintings, photography, glass, photographic pillows and table runners, soaps and lotions, candles, knives, gourd art, jams, honey products, purses, toys, quilts, and more.

If you visit in September, don't miss the Off the Beaten Path Studio Tour. This free, self-guided driving tour offers a rare chance to step inside private studios, meet the artists, and buy one-of-a-kind works directly from the source.

If you need a break from the music, Downtown Mountain View offers a charming blend of the eclectic and the delicious. Explore boutiques filled with "funky" fashion, rare crystals, vintage books, handmade home décor and a selection of one-of-a-kind items that reflect the

spirit of the Ozarks.

With all Mountain View has to offer, it's easy to see why visitors love coming to the Folk Music Capital of the World.



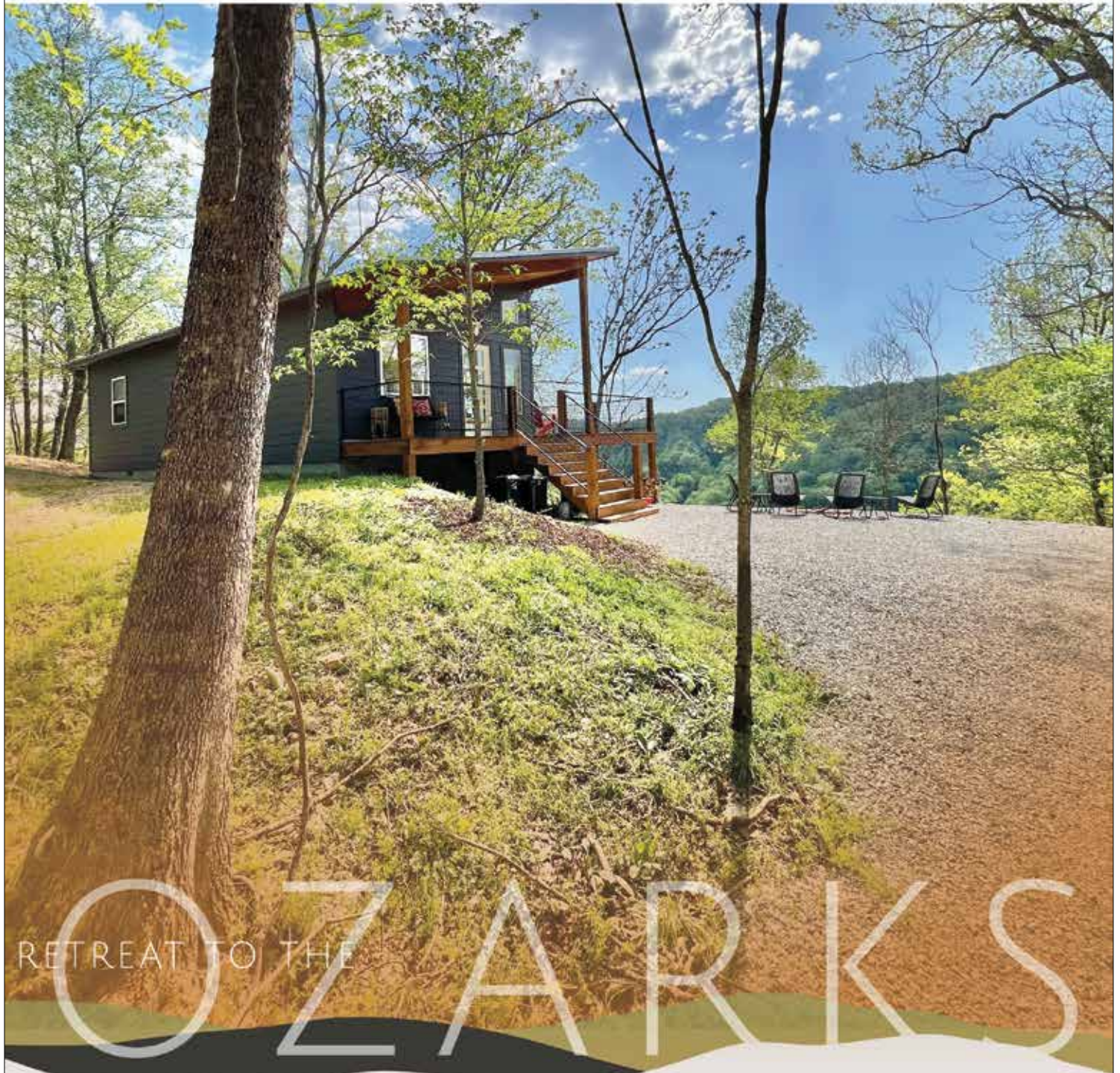
